
Volunteer Greater Nashua - A useful new resource for volunteers and organizations

Annual Investment

\$1 a day will provide a security deposit for a family to transition from homele

\$1 a day will provide breakfast for one preschool child for a whole year.

\$3 a day will buy an older or disabled adult a month of home delivered meals and safety check with each meal.

Individuals Served

\$5 a week will feed 4 children 5 nights a week for a month.

\$10 a week will provide 10 families with heat assistance.

\$10 a week will allow a child impacted by substance abuse the opportunity to attend camp for week.

\$20 a week will provide 346 meals to children who do not have meals at home.

\$20 a week will allow a dying patient to spend up to three days in hospice care.
